Dry Gulch Road Closure Continues through June

The reconstruction of Dry Gulch Road that began in April will continue through at least the end of June with a full road closure. For the present time Dry Gulch is closed from US 34 to Wildfire Road. The only access to church is:

- From the intersection of Wonderview Ave. and MacGregor Ave., take MacGregor north.
- MacGregor Ave. curves at the entrance to MacGregor Ranch, becoming Devil's Gulch Rd.
- Continue east on Devil's Gulch Rd. in the direction of Glen Haven.
- At the intersection of Devil's Gulch Rd. and County Rd 61/H Bar G Rd. (unmarked), bear right onto County Rd 61.
- At the intersection of County Rd 61 and Dry Gulch Road, turn right or south and continue south on Dry Gulch Road until you get to Ptarmigan Trail.

This route will add a few minutes to your commute. Please plan ahead.

June 2016 If Trees Can Do It, Why Not the Church?

There is a small hillside in my yard that needs vegetation to anchor the soil. I recently transplanted some additional aspen trees to help out. Why aspen trees?

Aspen have an ingenious way of propagating. Once established, aspens have the ability to propagate out of a network of interconnected roots. They aren't individual trees as much as they are one big connected organism. Aspen are self-starting by decentralizing and dispersing its vitality throughout an entire system of life. If you cut down an individual aspen, more will often start growing as a result. This characteristic leads some people to consider aspen more of a weed than a tree. I like to think of it as being very good at adapting to new conditions.

If trees can do it, why not churches?

In their book, *Growing Spiritual Redwoods*, Bill Easum and Tom Bandy write the following. Each individual, team, or group of the Body of Christ is a microcosm of freedom. They can consider any option, design any plan, and implement any activity immediately and without middle management. At the same time, each part of the organism is linked to the other parts of the organism by networks of learning and communication. (p. 146)

Perhaps I chose the wrong tree to make my point. A redwood is a much more impressive tree than an aspen, but you get the point. Learning, growing and communicating are what organisms need to live. We've known for a long time that churches that have the ability to adapt to new circumstances are better able to meet people where they are in life. In our congregation's preparation for a Comprehensive Ministry Review in September, I hope we can together recognize the importance of vibrant faith in our church. It anchors us but at the same time adapts to changing circumstances. The more we can recognize the importance of these key characteristics, the more we see the abundant opportunities that surrounds us.

Wartburg Seminary Student Nathan Wicks Says "Thank You"





Successful Cleanup Saturday



Getting to Know...George and Carolyn Jarmin

George and Carolyn have been happily married for twenty-nine years, but they've followed very different careers. George, a native Coloradoan born in Waverly, shares his two children, four grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren with Carolyn. A retired auto mechanic and welder, he put his handyman skills to work when the two of them, with the help of friends and neighbors, built their own home on the property they bought in 1991 near Bunce School Road, just beyond Allenspark.

At one point, using a completely different skill set, George was employed by the Colorado Department of Wildlife as a member of the team that reintroduced moose to the Walden area. Even though he's retired now, George can still tell you "everything you wanted to know but were afraid to ask" about moose.

Carolyn, on the other hand, grew up in Erie, Pennsylvania, graduated from the University of Pittsburgh,



and did graduate work in education at the University of Alaska. In 1974 she moved to Denver, where she served as a substitute teacher at George Washington High School and Hamilton Middle School. She began working for the Hearing Division at the Colorado Department of Revenue in 1976, then became a hearing officer, traveling throughout the state in 1978 before retiring in 2011. Why Fair Trade Products?

Your Fair Trade chocolate and coffee purchases make a big difference in the world as we partner with Lutheran World Relief (LWR) in the Coffee and Cocoa Initiative. —Linda Schlitt, SMLC Fair Trade Coordinator



Why Coffee and Cocoa?

Despite strong global demand for coffee and cocoa, producers of these crops often struggle to provide for their families, capturing just a fraction of their crops' full market value. LWR believes that satisfying global demand for coffee and cocoa, as well as improving the incomes and food security of the producers who grow them, can

and should go hand in hand.

LWR works with smallholder coffee and cocoa producers in Latin America, Asia and Africa to:

- Create linkages along value chains that benefit producers
- Contribute to environmental sustainability, and
- Create profits for socially responsible businesses

It's a triple bottom line: People, Planet and Profit—to help improve producers' lives from the ground up.

What We Do

With expertise developed over decades, LWR brings a unique perspective and skill set to support sustainable coffee and cocoa production. To address producers' needs, LWR works with cooperatives and producer organizations to:

- Provide training and access to inputs
- Support improved post-harvest processing and facilitate organic, Fair Trade and other certifications for improved market access
- Convene actors from across the value chain, creating opportunities for dialogue and mutual learning

LWR's expertise extends to the consumer side of the equation as well. In the United States, LWR:

- Markets Fair Trade coffee and chocolate to LWR's U.S. supporters, empowering them to make conscious consumer choices
- Holds an equity stake in Divine Chocolate USA, the world's first producer-owned chocolate brand
- Collaborates with strategic partners who recognize the excellence of LWR's work

LWR's Approach

LWR improves producer livelihoods by optimizing opportunities presented in the coffee and cocoa markets. LWR also supports producers to increase coffee and cocoa production, improve quality, and gain greater market access and bargaining power with buyers, ultimately increasing their profits. LWR works with cooperatives and producers' groups to expand their scale and improve their financial and management capacity, and collective investment in infrastructure, such as post-harvest processing technology. LWR promotes engagement with international markets by supporting smallholder farmers to secure third party certifications from Fair Trade USA, Rainforest Alliance, UTZ Certified, Fairtrade International (FLO) and others. Strategic alliances with key industry players also provide technical expertise and assistance in production and processing, sample analysis and interactive feedback, which benefit producers' sales.

On Monday, May 16th at SMLC, WELCA served about 45 guests at the Retired Pastors Luncheon. This is one of three fund raising projects carried out during the year. Hats off to Sandy Stolte, Sally Tessler and Paula Stensvaag for preparing and bringing the needed additional desserts. What a wonderful pie assortment for the pastors and how they enjoyed them. WELCA received over \$400, which will be used for those in need locally and around the globe.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday, June 14th, centering on the Bible study entitled "Treasury in Clay Jars" from 2 Corinthians, Chapter 4. It deals with conflict, forgiveness and reconciliation. We will also look at scripture in John and Romans in dealing with conflict. This is a challenge for all of us at home, in the workplace and even at church. —*Marilyn Kienker*

Church Council Meeting Summary May 9, 2016


