Dry Gulch Road Closure



July 2016 Living and Coping with Uncertainty

It was the summer of 1981. I was enrolled in my first seminary class, remedial philosophy. On the weekends my fellow students and I tried to escape our un-air conditioned dorm rooms by going to city parks and free concerts. Sitting around one Saturday afternoon, someone in our sweat-soaked group suggested we take in The Prairie Home Companion show in St. Paul. "Oh," I said, "what's that?" The group proceeded to fill me in about the live radio show performed on stage and broadcast nationally. The names and stories were as unknown to me as the ancient philosophies we were studying. They included *Powdermilk Biscuits, Lives of the Cowboys* and monologues about the fictional *Lake Wobegon* by a guy named Garrison Keillor. I was interested in attending until someone reminded the group that it wasn't free. We went to the park instead.

Mr. Keillor, 73, will host his final official "Prairie Home Companion" on July 1st at, of all places, the Hollywood Bowl. Public radio always wondered what it was going to do when Garrison left. It's about to find out!

It is somewhat comforting to me that the feeling of uncertainty is not isolated to the church. There is a lot of uncertainty in our world today. Perhaps there has always been uncertainty in our lives, but that it seems more amplified now through the media. We know more about what is happening in our world, but that knowledge doesn't guarantee the comfort of certainty.

This is apparent in the results of a survey our Rocky Mountain Synod asked its clergy to complete. Bishop Jim Gonia wrote his interpretation of the survey results in part with the following:

While there were several operational challenges, there was clearly one over-arching challenge. Uncertainty. There is a high degree of anxiety about what the future holds for the church and the viability of professional church vocations among church leaders. It will not be enough to simply continue to lift the issues, as issue fatigue is overwhelming. This is also not a call for a programmatic fix. There is however, a clear desire for a vision of the ways forward to be cast. One of the roots of this anxiety is the perception of reduced resources.

I hope you are beginning to realize that Shepherd of the Mountains will address the challenges the Bishop mentions beginning with a **Comprehensive Ministry Review** on September 9th, 10th and 11th. A ministry review is a time to reflect together on how the mission is going and what kind of health is present for carrying that mission forward. It is a chance to be the church together and mutually assess what's next.

Please know that your church council is working hard at inviting members of the congregation, Estes Park community partners and synod staff and volunteers to join in this important conversation. If you are asked to participate specifically, it means we see you as important to the process. Be flattered and agree to participate! All members will be asked to take part in a congregational forum Sunday morning after worship. The more participation we have, the better our review will serve us in planning our future.

The biggest hurdle to uncertainty is avoidance. If we avoid talking about the challenge before us, we give it more power than it really has. Our strength comes through Him in whose name we gather, Christ Jesus the Lord. (Matthew 18:18-20)

Getting to Know...Earl and Nancy Matson

Earl and Nancy Matson came from diverse backgrounds to meet in Estes Park at Shepherd of the Mountains in March 1995. Pastor Earl, knowing Nancy was single because of a letter from her St. Louis pastor, asked Nancy if he could drop by for a visit on a Sunday afternoon...and that he did. It was during the announcement of the March Madness team selection, and Nancy's daughter (a University of Illinois student) was home for spring break. Nancy had beef stew cooking in the crockpot, but didn't invite Earl to stay for dinner because she thought he might have a "Mrs." back at the parsonage. Thus started, hesitantly,

their relationship.



Earl was born September 27, 1937 in Fargo, ND. His grandparents were Swedish immigrants. He actually lived in Moorhead, MN, going to school there and eventually graduating from Concordia College in 1959, majoring in sociology. Earl felt the call to be a pastor and attended Augustana Seminary, graduating in 1963 and moving to serve a parish in Lockport, IL with his wife and two sons. Another son and daughter were born later as Earl accepted a call to Bethany Lutheran in Colorado Springs. Through the succeeding years he was divorced and served two other churches in Colorado, gradually moving north. In 1994 a committee including Bill Westley and

Allen Settje visited with Earl, at that time in Louisville, inviting him to meet the fellowship of Lutherans in Estes Park. Fortunately for this congregation he accepted that invitation and became the Mission Developer of Shepherd of the Mountains, working at the church part-time and driving a limo to supplement his income.

Nancy was born in St. Louis on December 18, 1941, and lived in a rural suburb of Creve Coeur, ID, where her German-lineage grandparents lived. Although Nancy was always a cowgirl at heart, she earned a B.A. from Washington University, majoring in Spanish and French. After a brief marriage to a "cowboy" and the birth of daughter Robin, she divorced and remarried, this time to a farmer. The couple lived on her family's Missouri farm and kept horses. During that time Nancy was quite active in a very liberal Missouri Synod Lutheran Church that leaned toward the Seminex split (eventually leading to the ELCA formation). She returned to college at Maryville University, earning a degree in Music Therapy and a subsequent career in health care. In 1993, when second daughter Aimee was finishing high school, the Missouri River flooded the farm and house in St. Louis County. That was enough of Missouri! Nancy had the home restored, leased it out and moved to Estes Park in 1995 to live in the house she'd built here several years earlier as a rental.

Fast forward to fall of that year, when Earl and Nancy were married by the Rev. John Refsell in Moraine Park on October 22, 1995. The newlyweds began their productive partnership by participating in community groups and working with this mission congregation, which was formally organized in 1997. Both were on the board of Habitat for Humanity. In addition, Earl belonged to Rotary and Restorative Justice. He served as a volunteer chaplain with the Estes Park Police Department, hospice, the RMNP Crisis Team and Victim Advocates. He was active in men's golf and both he and Nancy hiked quite a bit. Nancy became the activities director at Prospect Park Living Center and later at the Estes Park Senior Center.

When she wasn't substituting periodically for the church secretary, Nancy resumed horseback riding, kept up with the St. Louis Cardinals, and together they embarked on many trips, especially to their Puerto Vallarta timeshare and camping throughout Colorado.

Now they're enjoying retirement. Although Earl retired as pastor of SMLC in September 1999, he continued with many volunteer activities, most recently as a volunteer at Bear Lake in RMNP. He still enjoys hiking, swimming, reading novels, working out at Med-X and watching the Rockies. Similarly Nancy has focused her retirement interests on gardening, cooking, painting, reading, spiritual study, contemplative prayer, singing and playing the guitar. Nancy is also active with the Worship Committee, WELCA and the Second Saturday worship team. They live on Highway 66 in their "little house" with their brown tabby Buster "who *rules*," although Earl does get beef stew now and then in the winter. And as often as possible they enjoy sitting on their deck taking in the wildlife and beauty around them.

The other members of SMLC can feel very fortunate that this loving couple, so generous in serving others, has made their home among us and contributed to the growth of this congregation in so many important ways. Thank you, Earl and Nancy.—*Lynette Johnson*

Summer Ushers in Meditative Hikes




We enjoyed the first church meditative hike at Lily Lake with a nice number of participants. At 4:45 pm, just before the hike began, there was a downpour of rain with darkened sky and visible lightening streaks. Ten minutes later the sky was a beautiful blue with a few fluffy clouds, so those who stayed till 5:00 pm were rewarded with the hour-long hike.

The meditative hikes allow participants to experience nature's sacred space. The walks are set at a leisurely pace with designated stops for a meditative reading. Some readings are beside benches to allow people to sit for a bit if they wish. Participants are encouraged to linger as long as they like, and catch up. The tone of the hike is low voices and little conversation.

We plan to have hikes every Monday evening at 5:00 pm with other locations around Estes Park and Rocky Mountain National Park to be announced. Dress for the weather, bring some water, perhaps binoculars (we spotted a moose at the west end of Lily Lake), sunscreen and a walking stick if you like. The trail is handicapped accessible and suitable for wheelchairs. There will be a variety of leaders for the hikes.—Nancy Matson




How About a Pleasant Morning Activity?

- January 24th Annual Meeting minutes approved with a correction to a typo "In 2015, we paid \$350/month (\$4200 annual) in principal pay down reducing our loan term by **seven** [not seventeen] months."
- Action: distribute February and April special congregational meeting minutes to the congregation.
- John Stencel presented the nominating committee report and comments on challenges in finding people who can serve. The following incoming council members were approved by acclamation: Mike Kellam for a three-year term. Deb Paddock and Gary Wallace sharing three-year term. Alternates: Rick Stolte and Bill Westley for one-year terms. The third three-year term is vacant. Thanked outgoing council members: Jean Siddle, Jim Stensvaag, Heidi Johnson.
- Committee Reports presented and approved: Witness, Learning, Service, Lutheran Men in Mission, WELCA, Stewardship, Property, and Worship.
- Bill Hayford, Assistant Treasurer, thanked Keith Riedesel, Gary Trunnell and Deb Paddock of the Audit Committee for completion of the 2015 audit which follows the ELCA's audit program guidelines. Audit committee's recommendation is to store financial and legal records in a fireproof locking cabinet and to look into digital record keeping. Kris Adams, Treasurer, and Ruth Turner, Financial Secretary recognized for their work.
