The Soul of the Church

As we enter the closing weeks of summer we ask, "Where has the time gone?" The end of summer is often a reflective time for me as I recall the wonderful experiences of the past several weeks and wish that summer was two months longer. Perhaps it is an emotional pattern that developed when I was younger and still a student; I'm not sure. This I know: the time of the year impacts how I experience life.

This of course is also true for my own journey of faith and my calling in the church. Each of us travels through the seasons of life experiencing untold motivations and feelings. None of us stay the same as we live into the next season, the next surprise and the next challenge. As exciting and scary as it all is, we trust that we don't go it alone. At the end of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells us, "I am with you always, to the end of the age." (28:20).

Trusting we are being led by the *Resurrected One* we step forward into the next season of the year and our life together as the church. We can't assume we know the way, or even ourselves, to go it alone. Fortunately, as the church we are given the collective wisdom of faith and discernment to chart the course ahead. Call it "soul searching" for our congregation if you will; I like what the German poet, Rilke, wrote:


Summer was like your house: you knew where each thing stood. Now you must go out into your heart as onto a vast plain. Now the immense loneliness begins.

Planning and charting the future are not easy. That is why Shepherd of the Mountains will be engaged in a reflective discussion called the *Comprehensive Ministry Review*, *September 9th*, *10th and 11th*. Think of it as an intentional conversation focused on the accomplishments of the past, balanced with hopes for the future—not unlike what happens in annual job reviews. Such conversations are happening informally all the time. Our Comprehensive Ministry Review will formally conduct conversations with ministry leaders in the congregation, and people from Estes Park who are connected to SMLC in some manner (i.e., Café Corner, Crossroads, music concerts). In addition, a congregational forum for everyone will be held immediately after the worship service on September 11th.

The church council has been working hard to line up participants for this review. If you have not been approached and would like to participate in more than the open congregational forum on Sunday, please talk to a church council member or to me. It will require participation on Saturday from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm, and on Sunday, 9:00 am-2:00 pm. Each person's input is important to this process. Let's make the most of this unique opportunity for our congregation to face the future together!



August Miscellany

- The Anglo-Saxons called August "Weodmonath" or Weed Month.
- In the U.S., August is the month with the highest birthrate and least precipitation.
- The August full moon was known by Native Americans of the Upper Midwest as the Full Sturgeon Moon because the sturgeon of the Great Lakes and Lake Champlain were most readily caught then. Other tribes called it the Green Corn Moon, the Grain Moon or the Red Moon. This month's full moon occurs on August 18th.
- August is the time of the Perseid meteor showers, when planet Earth travels through the tail of the Swift-Tuttle comet. The meteor showers are called the Perseids because they appear to explode out of

the constellation Perseus. The Perseids will peak this year on August 12th-13th, with the best viewing after midnight. This year's

- meteor shower is predicted to be twice as heavy as normal.
- August is deep into the dog days of summer, a notion that goes back thousands of years. The dog days got its name due to the coincidental rising at sunrise, just above the eastern horizon, of Sirius the Dog Star at this time of year. Sirius is the brightest star in the Earth's night sky and part of the constellation Canis Major, or Great Dog. The dog days were generally recognized as the period from July 14th to September 5th, and were considered a volatile time of hot weather, fires and illness.
- On the other hand, August also signaled the annual flooding of the Nile, an event received with great joy by the Egyptians. And in the northern lands, August was the beginning of the harvest.
- ♦ Here in Colorado, August is the best month to enjoy Palisade peaches, Rocky Ford melons and Olathe sweet corn.

I have made fun of Lutherans for years—who wouldn't if you lived in Minnesota? But I have also sung with Lutherans and that is one of the main joys of life, along with hot baths and fresh sweet corn. We make fun of Lutherans for their blandness, their excessive calm, their fear of giving offense, their lack of speed and also for their secret fondness for macaroni and cheese. But nobody sings like them.

If you ask an audience in New York City, a relatively "Lutheran-less" place, to sing along on the chorus of "Michael, Row the Boat Ashore" they will look daggers at you as if you had asked them to strip to their underwear. But if you do this among Lutherans they'll smile and row that boat ashore and up the beach! And down the road!

- Lutherans drink coffee as if it were the third Sacrament.
- Some Lutherans still believe that an ELCA bride and an LCMS groom make for a mixed marriage.
- Lutherans feel guilty for not staying to clean up after their own wedding reception in the Fellowship Hall.
- Lutherans are willing to pay up to a dollar for a meal at church.
- ♦ Lutherans think that Garrison Keillor stories are totally factual.

meat or fish, canned or frozen vegetables, and canned soup.


Originated from the American Upper Midwest, particularly Minnesota






School Bags for Lutheran World Relief
