## September 2016 The Invitation is "Come"

At the very end of the Bible, in the last book of Revelation, it says: The Spirit and the bride say, "Come." And let everyone who hears say, "Come." And let everyone who is thirsty come. Let anyone who wishes the water of life as a gift. (Rev. 22:17)

For the past few months the church council and I have been discussing an important event in our congregation called the *Comprehensive Ministry Review*. This review is a helpful tool our Rocky Mountain Synod offers to churches who want to take an honest look at their ministry and begin to plan for their future. There is nothing harder than planning for the future. However, one thing is certain: if we don't make the effort to plan and don't envision what God can do through this congregation, we'll be asking the same questions in the future we are asking now. This Comprehensive Ministry Review provides an opportunity to join others in the ELCA and our Synod in discerning our calling to share the gospel of Jesus Christ and serve the neighbor.

The **Comprehensive Ministry Review** will take place September 9th, 10th and 11th. It will involve three main groups: the **Synod Ministry Review Team**, the **Congregational Team** and the **SMLC Congregation**. Here is a brief rundown of the schedule.

#### Friday, September 9th

The Synod Ministry Review Team arrives and tours the church building and community. They then meet with Pastor Ron and Phyllis Eggers before having dinner and working on detailed plans for the next two days.

#### Saturday, September 10<sup>th</sup>

The Synod Team meets with various leaders from Estes Park who work cooperatively with our congregation such as Crossroads Ministry, Good Samaritan Society and Café Corner. At around 10:00 am the Congregational Team begins its work. These are congregation members the church council asked specifically to participate in the discussions. The Synod Team will lead discussions and assignments for both teams until about 6:00 pm, at which time work ends for the Congregational Team but continues for the Synod Team until after supper.

#### Sunday, September 11<sup>th</sup>

Worship is at 9:00 am, followed by a congregational forum during coffee fellowship. Here is where **all congregational members** are involved. This is an open forum discussing the key issues of our congregation. Following the forum, the Synod and Congregational Teams meet once again to discuss both affirmations and recommendations generated by the all the prior discussions. A final meeting with Pastor Ron will then take place and plans for a follow-up meeting will be made.

Why do this? Because we've been given the greatest invitation the world knows: "Come." (Rev. 22)

In his book, We Make the Road by Walking, author Brian McLaren writes: "What was true for Revelation's original audience is true for us today. Whatever madman is in power, whatever chaos is breaking out, whatever danger threatens, the river of life is flowing now. The Tree of Life is bearing fruit now. True aliveness is available now. That's why Revelation ends with the sound of a single word echoing through the universe. That word is not Wait! Nor is it Not Yet! or Someday! It is a word of invitation and welcome...We echo it back. Together with the Spirit, we say it to everyone who is willing. Come!" (p.257)

## September Trivia

• Labor Day weekend marks the traditional close of the summer season and, once upon a time, was the last weekend in which the color white or seersucker fabric could be worn.

• For gridiron fans, September is the beginning of football season.

• The Anglo-Saxons called September Gerstmonath (barley month) or Haefestmonath (harvest month) since it was their time to harvest barley.

• The Old Farmer's Almanac predicts a cold and early winter for our region. Certainly the signs in Estes right now point to an early

winter. But the National Weather Service is predicting exactly the opposite, with a *warmer* than average winter. (It's worth noting that last year at this time, the National Weather Service prediction was for a "monster" El Nino, which never materialized. So take your pick…maybe flip a coin?)

- In the New World, the September full moon corresponded with corn harvest. Accordingly, Native
  Americans referred to it as the Corn Moon. It's also called the Harvest Moon, which this year is on
  September 16th. Whichever full moon is closest to the Autumnal Equinox is called the Harvest Moon,
  so-named because it gave farmers extra light during the time of harvest so they could bring in their crops.
  The term harvest moon goes all the way back to at least the time of Charlemagne in eighth-century
  Europe.
- Traditionally, hummingbird feeders were put up on Mother's Day and taken down on Labor Day. But did you know that you can keep your feeders up through the end of September? The new rule of thumb is to wait until a week after you've seen the last hummingbird to bring in your feeders for the season. This can be anywhere from the middle of September to the first week in October. Just make sure those feeders aren't accessible to bears!

## Getting to Know...Don and Gloria Lickfett

This very active couple joined SMLC nearly twenty years ago and immediately began serving in many capacities. Both Don and Gloria have served on the SMLC council. Gloria acts as SMLC's weddings chairman, sings in the choir, often serves as teller, helps with WELCA hospitality projects and frequently provides snacks after church. Don was the usher coordinator for nine years. He has also served continuously on the property committee, helps with decorating the church for Christmas and constantly makes improvements so church facilities will be even more efficient and hospitable. Generous hospitality is the Lickfett's specialty.

Before retiring, the two had many years of experience in the hospitality business operating motels, first in Loveland and later in Frisco. Back in 1973, Don had up until that point worked with his father in the grain business and had also been a banker. Gloria was an elementary school teacher, and they were still busy raising their five daughters: Sue, Sally, Sarah, and the twins, Julie and Janet. But that year, in 1973, they bravely launched themselves into a completely new adventure by buying a small motel in Loveland. Of course their young daughters helped with the work. Ten years later the Lickfetts bought another small motel in Frisco and retired from there. Now they continue spreading their hospitality through their church and home.



Fortunately for our church members, the Lickfetts had always wanted to live in Estes Park. When asked how they first heard about SMLC, Gloria explained, "It was not hard. At that time (1997) SMLC (when it was meeting in the Seventh Day Adventist Church) was right across the street from where we were building." They still live in that same wonderfully hospitable home at 410 Fall River Lane, where many of us have gathered for good food and fellowship.

Not only have Don and Gloria opened their home and hearts to the members of SMLC, but also to the Estes community. Don has served on several charitable boards, delivered Meals on Wheels, and volunteered many hours at Crossroads. Gloria is a very active volunteer for Hospice and the McGregor Ranch Museum. In addition, both of them have been volunteering for the past sixteen years at Rocky Mountain National Park.

Still working in many of these volunteer capacities, whether separately or together, the whole 57-year marriage has definitely been greater than the sum of its parts. Their relationship began as just friends when they were very young, way back in high school. But their romance developed during college when Don was attending St. Olaf College in Minnesota and Gloria was going to Mankato State Teachers College. That romance is still going strong, giving them the strength and motivation to share their love and the love of Christ with all of SMLC and those living in the entire area.—*Lynette Johnson*

# Lutheran Trívía Bowl

- Q. Martin Luther actually wanted a different name for the denomination other than Lutheran. What was the name he wanted?
- A. Evangelical Catholic. Fun fact: The term "Lutheran" was originally used as a pejorative during the Reformation, but eventually Lutherans stopped fighting it, gave up and accepted the name. It was the first known instance of Lutherans turning lemons into lemonade.
- Q. When and where was the first Lutheran service in North America?
- A. In 1619, King Christian IV of Denmark dispatched an expedition to explore North America. Lutheran Pastor Rasmus Jensen gave a sermon on January 23, 1620, near present-day Manitoba. Tragically, only the ship's captain and two others (unfortunately, not Jensen) survived the perilous journey and returned to Denmark.
