#### After the Election

If you're like me you can't wait until the election this month is over and done with. My hope is the fighting and arguing of the last few months will give way to listening and unity. Yet even by stating my hope in writing I can't shake the feeling that I am naïve and setting myself up for disappointment. That's sad for me to admit.

As Christians we confess we are sinners and we know that will also be true for the winner of this election. We also will continue to live in a society which doesn't fully live up to its stated ideals. Too often self-interest is the motivation instead of the common good. That can be both discouraging and motivating for us as followers of Christ.

Perhaps the goal we need to keep in mind is closer to us than Washington D.C. It resides in our home, our neighborhood and our town. That goal includes being authentic with one another even when all is not well. I'm not suggesting we put on a happy face while we slowly burn inside, but rather practice honoring the God-given dignity of others by listening and speaking in love. The Apostle Paul suggested this to the Ephesians when he wrote, "Let no evil talk come out of your mouths, but only what is useful for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear." (Ephesians 4:29). We have it wrong when our passions drive us to act and speak as if our way is the only right way. Let's honor the gift of relationship that we share as fortunate citizens of this country and ultimately as children of God. We can do this by reflecting divine grace in what we say and do.

#### A Time to Give Thanks

Is it a coincidence that general elections are held in the same month as the Thanksgiving holiday? I don't know. So why not take advantage of Thanksgiving by joining with others in giving thanks? Once again SMLC will partner with several other churches in Estes Park in a community Thanksgiving event. It will take place at the **United Methodist Church on Tuesday, November 22<sup>nd</sup> at 1:00 pm**. Your participation will signal a willing spirit to join others in giving thanks for the life we enjoy here in Estes Park. There will be three ways to give an offering. The monetary offering will be for Crossroads Ministry, as well as in-kind gifts of paper products and canned food. In addition, the annual Crossroads coat collection will be extended to help with the needs of refugees living in communities on the front range. You may donate coats by dropping them off at Crossroads or bringing them to the Thanksgiving Service.

#### Go Deeper with Matthew

The last Sunday this month is the first Sunday of ADVENT! Advent marks the beginning of the church year and a change in the Sunday scripture lessons. This coming Advent season will begin a year-long focus on the gospel of Matthew and its supporting scripture lessons. Have you ever wanted to understand the gospel better? Here's your chance. I am leading an eight-session, in-depth study of Matthew on Tuesday mornings at 8:00 am. # Fair Trade Third Quarter Update

In October I took time to look at the numbers for the first nine months of the year. Your purchases really add up! As of September 30th, \$975.35 has gone through Fair Trade to small farmers and their cooperatives. Through September 2016 your local WELCA has graciously paid up front so that it's easy for you to access Fair Trade products. *And* they've invested an additional \$146.03 in inventory so a good stock of items is available. Wow—thank you! Thanks to everyone at SOM for our continued choice to purchase and use Fair Trade coffee for coffee hours. Together we're making a difference in how these products are grown and manufactured, but especially in helping small farmers and their families and communities. Through Lutheran World Relief, the Fair Trade Exchanges and our world partners, we can continue to make a difference.

# Getting to Know...Bill and Connie Westley

Bill and Connie have been founders and supporters of this large church family as well as their own large family. Married for over 56 years, they have three living children: Tamra (58), Michael (55), and Marla (49). Two other sons, Matthew and Greg, were tragically killed in accidents in 2000 and 2013, respectively. The Westleys gave the beautiful large cross that hangs above the SMLC altar in Matthew and Greg's memory.



They also keep twenty-four grandchildren and twenty-three great-grandchildren in their prayers.

Before moving to Estes Park in 1989, the Westleys raised their five children in several locations where Bill worked. He was a college professor at Fort Hays State University in Kansas and at Northern Illinois University. Bill was head of the Accounting Data Processing Department at Illinois Central College in Peoria for twenty-five years, where he taught computer programming. He also worked for the National Cash Register Company in Dayton, Ohio.

After they "retired" to Estes Park, Bill worked part-time at Rains Motor Company as Fleet Manager, coordinating drivers for vehicle transportation until

Rains went out of business. Although he didn't require his drivers to be Lutheran, it just turned out that way because he was a very active member of the fledgling SMCL congregation. He still is an active member, having served whenever needed on the Church Council, serving three times as President, and participating as a very reliable member of the tenor section in the choir.

More importantly, Bill and Connie were instrumental in founding Shepherd of the Mountains Lutheran Church. In case newer members don't know how SMLC came into being, it evolved from the efforts of a group calling themselves the Estes Park Lutheran Fellowship. This group adopted the official name Shepherd of the Mountains in 1994. They subsequently gained a charter from the Rocky Mountain Synod of the ELCA and became a recognized congregation. As they grew in numbers, the congregation eventually built the present facility. In fact, Bill—along with the now deceased Reverend Arthur Becker—collaborated in writing a brief history of SMLC's early years. Bill's current project is a revision of that document. With a little encouragement he'd be willing to publish that revision in installments of *The Shepherd's Crook* newsletter or in the Sunday worship service bulletins.

Meanwhile, Connie has her own projects. She was the owner and manager of the Mountain Lady Quilt Shop here in Estes for fifteen years and still is an avid quilter. When she isn't keeping track of their children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren, Connie creates the designs she forms into beautiful new quilts.

Quilt piecing seems symbolic of the way Bill and Connie have pieced together a warm and loving life, and of the essential ingredients needed to form a vital, loving and worshipping family of faith that we now know as Shepherd of the Mountains Lutheran Church.—Lynette Johnson



On Thankoffering Sunday, quilters will have a basket in the narthex for a free will offering to help defray the cost of shipping these quilts overseas.
