Pastor's Corner

Is Transformation on Your List for 2017?

s we face 2017 what's on your mind? Has the recent election put you in a political mode that you can't shake? Is there something in your personal life dominating your attention? Perhaps this is the year to go through with that surgery you've been putting off. Or maybe in 2017 you will travel to that destination you've always wanted to visit. You might even be thinking about Shepherd of the Mountains and what shape the future will have on our ministry. That' great! I'm glad all these things have you thinking. It shows you value your life and care about how you spend your time. In affirmation of this new year let me now suggest how you see and relate to God will determine how you experience the new year.

My lofty suggestion is influenced by a book I'm now reading by Richard Rohr. The title is, The Divine Dance—The Trinity and Your Transformation. It will be the focus for both a book discussion and adult forum sessions in the weeks ahead. (Information on ordering a hard cover or digital copy are in this newsletter)

The premise of Rohr's book is to re-examine the ancient doctrine of the Trinity. You might recall hearing about the Trinity as far back as confirmation. It is usually introduced with The Apostle's Creed and its three-part structure: I believe God the Father almighty... I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only son... I believe in the Holy Spirit. It's basic Christian doctrine. Countless confirmation lessons have been taught on the Creed and the solid biblical evidence of professing one God in three persons; or has it? Teachers of the faith have always done a great job at explaining God as Father, Son and Spirit. But when it comes to teaching how each is part of One God, we are often at a loss for words. Rohr's book attempts to give us those words and practices.

He writes, "Whatever is going on in God is a flow, a radical relatedness, a perfect communion between Three—a circle dance of love." This is the metaphor from where the book gets its name. However, we are told such language is very traditional, especially with the ancient Greek Fathers. But to say "God is the dance" is not traditional for most Christians and is practiced by very few.

The book opens these ancient treasures of wisdom and encourages the reader to take them out on the dance floor for a spin. Another quote that hit me reads:

We always become what we behold; the presence that we practice matters. That's why we desperately need a worldwide paradigm shift in Christian consciousness regarding how we relate to God. (loc 502)

The primary question before us this year and beyond is not what we can do; but rather what we can become. People who are willing to put in time studying and practicing will experience God as always involved instead of the deity that leaves most of humanity "orphaned" much of the time. And isn't that what this faith is all about-- God who is present and flows through everything, without exception?

One need not be a biblical expert to join this discussion at many different levels. Your honest search for truth at this time in your life is the essential thing. Exploring The Divine Dance could very well be the jumping off spot you need to start 2017. Please consider the opportunity.


