The Latest Technology has Always Spoken Theology

n this 500th anniversary year of the Protestant Reformation we stop to consider the role of technology. The Reformation was significantly aided by the development of the printing press. In fact, the Reformation helped further advances in the technology of mechanical movable type. The man who got it going was Johannes Gutenburg.

Wikipedia says this about him: Johannes Gutenburg; (c. 1398 – February 3, 1468) was a German blacksmith, goldsmith, printer, and publisher who introduced printing to Europe. His introduction of mechanical movable type printing to Europe started the Printing Revolution and is widely regarded as the most important invention of the second millennium, the seminal event which ushered in the modern period of human history. It played a key role in the development of the Renaissance, Reformation, the Age of Enlightenment, and the scientific revolution and laid the material basis for the modern knowledge-based economy and the spread of learning to the masses.

Not everyone in Luther's time could read. Therefore, what important issues do you publish for both people who can and cannot read? The most popular form of Reformation literature was the pamphlet, published in small, quarto size and usually provided wood cut illustrations(i.e. pictures). Dealing with a great variety of subjects, they were written in the form of prose, verse, dialogues, and letters and bore such captivating titles as I Wonder Why There Is No Money in the Land? The message of reform was important enough for the Church to use the latest form of technology to reach out to people. Had it not, we might not be celebrating the Reformation this year.

Practices In Lent

esus says in his sermon on the mount, "But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you" Mt. 6:6

Have you ever wondered what you can do in such times of prayer. Consider the following look at meditation as a viable option for you and your prayer life.

There is no single way to meditate. There are, however, certain acts and attitudes inherently endowed with the capacity to awaken sustained states of meditative awareness that form the infrastructure of each specific way to meditate. Here are some suggested guidelines.

With respect to the body: Sit still. Sit straight. Place your hands in a comfortable or meaningful position in your lap. Close your eyes or lower them toward the ground. Breathe slowly and naturally. With respect to your mind, be present, open, and awake, neither clinging to nor rejecting anything. And with respect to attitude, maintain nonjudgmental compassion toward yourself—as you discover yourself clinging to and rejecting everything—and nonjudgmental compassion toward others in their powerlessness that is one with yours.

Dear members of SMLC,

ne of my favorite Bible verses is John 21:15-17, in which Jesus tells Simon Peter "if you love me, feed and care for my sheep". I believe that Jesus is calling upon us, the members of SMLC, to demonstrate Christian love by feeding and caring for our neighbors who need help. Specifically we do this through our support of organizations such as Crossroads Ministry, CCC! And La Puente in Alamosa.

On March 19th we will have a special offering to support Crossroads Ministry. This offering is in conjunction with the "2017 Neighbors in Need Challenge", the largest single source of funding for the ministry. An anonymous donor has once again made available \$50,000 in matching funds. Every dollar we raise will be matched. 86% of these funds go directly to program services, with 14% used to cover administrative expenses.

Crossroads does so much for our community and the Estes Valley. 1 in 12 residents receive some form of assistance from Crossroads in an average year, and 1 in 10 received assistance following the 2013 flood. They will see that you views are sent to your representative.

We are being challenged to continue Luther's legacy of activism and protest.

Getting to know Rich & Sandy Stolte

hen members of SMLC notice that Rich and Sandy Stolte have served communion again, coordinated another "Spring Fling" or Christmas party, or that Sandy has decorated the fellowship hall with new, seasonal centerpieces again (new table decorations every month since this facility was dedicated), they admire the generous spirit behind those contributions to the rich social life of this congregation. These noticeable contributions, however, are only the most recent indications of the Stolte's long ministry of service, not only to the Church but also to the public in general.

The energy and youthfulness of the Stoltes belies their lengthy record. The most memorable feature of their service to this congregation is that they are among the dwindling number of SMLC's charter members. Thank you, Rich and Sandy! In addition, Rich has often served as an alternate on the SMLC Council. Before moving to Estes, they were very active with the congregation at Immanuel Lutheran in Greeley, where they had lived and worked since their marriage 1962. He was the Sunday-school superintendent at Immanuel for fourteen years, where both he and Sandy taught Sunday school. He also served on the church council there. In addition, Rich was the Treasurer of the Lutheran Student Association at NCU.

Their public service was even more remarkable. They are educators by profession. Rich taught elementary education in Greeley District #6 for thirty-three years. Sandy did not avoid official responsibilities, either. She served as local President and State President of Theta Rho Girls (IOOF), as President of the Greeley Faculty Wives, and as both local and district President of the Greeley DOES Drove #216 (served five terms).

One has to wonder whether they might have moved from Greeley to Estes Just to get away from some of those responsibilities. But, no. Both of them have readily served their terms on the Retreat Association Board where they live.
