Advocacy in Action

Jesus said the peacemakers will be blessed and be called them children of God. This kind of peace comes from consenting to God's presence and action in our lives. Knowing that God is present makes all the difference – there can be no hatred when Love controls. Peace, Salaam, Shalom!

Congregational Sabbatical

his is the third consecutive article covering potential ministry goals which the church council has discussed. Go to the SMLC website at <u>www.smlcestes.org</u>; then open the church newsletter archive links for July and August. In my articles from those months you will find information on the first two goals that are being considered.

In mentioning the term, "congregational sabbatical", I've seen some funny looks on peoples' faces. I must admit I hadn't heard of it until the review committee last September recommended it to SMLC. Below is the actual recommendation that followed our comprehensive ministry review.

Consider a congregational sabbatical. What would happen if committees and teams didn't meet? Take a break from the work and enjoy what originally brought you to Estes Park and what originally brought you together as a community: Enjoying God's creation and being a Lutheran fellowship. Following a sabbatical, spend time reflecting on currents structures and ministries. Are they life-giving to the community? Can some be combined? Are they all needed? Have some reached the end of their life? Doing things your own way is part of who you are. Create your ministry around what works for you today. Be creative and utilize the gifts you currently have.

You have to admit this is different! The review team listened to us and sensed something in our past that might be missing in our life together now. This recommendation is an attempt to touch the heart of God which first helped to form the church. This doesn't mean we can turn back the hands of time but instead rediscover the Spirit's movement to further God's Kingdom. This important discovery can occur when time is dedicated to prayer, worship and reflection, the heart of a sabbatical.

What's difficult about a congregational sabbatical is the logistics. How would it work and what would we do differently and for how long? The questions are numerous but instead of getting hung up on the questions we can brainstorm ideas on how we might experience our church(i.e. people) differently than normal. It doesn't mean we would be on sabbatical indefinitely but for an agreed upon time period. Then what might be the benefit of such a time?

If we were to cease having a normal activity during a sabbatical it could provide us with an effective way to evaluate what we do. It would allow us to face questions about our identity and purpose no doubt. Breaking the regular cycle of congregational activities will undoubtedly create some discomfort, but ultimately help us learn to question and listen to one another. In addition, it would help to prevent burnout for those who have taken on too much responsibility and need the assistance of others. Sharing the work is vital to a sustainable model of ministry.

Finally, a sabbatical would reaffirm the sacredness of time. The very first thing God created was not matter but time—the "evening" and "morning" on the first day. The third commandment leads us to recognize the importance of "Sabbath", learning to make it, and all of life, Holy.

This third ministry initiative is both energizing and perplexing. I'm thankful that I have the Learning Committee working with me on how this might "grow legs" and be a vital option for SMLC. Together we will face the future. In Christ. Pastor Ron
