#### **Estes Park CROP Hunger Walk**

he annual Estes Park CROP Hunger Walk will take place on Sunday, September 16 at 1 PM. The Walk goes around Lake Estes starting and ending at the Estes Park Visitor Center. This year our church along with several other area churches will walk to raise funds to end hunger here in Estes Park and around the world.

Twenty-five percent of all money raised will be given to our local food bank ministry, Crossroads. The remaining 75% will be given to Church World Service, a world relief organization that has been assisting people throughout the globe since 1946.

CROP Hunger Walks help to provide food and water, as well as resources that empower people to meet their own needs. From seeds and tools, to wells and water systems, to technical training and micro-enterprise loans, the key is people working together to identify their own development priorities, their strengths and their needs.

As we walk, we not only raise funds to eliminate hunger but we identify with millions of people throughout our world who walk to meet their daily needs of food, water, fuel and shelter.

#### Pastor's Corner - Back in the Saddle

ow two and a half weeks since returning from sabbatical I must say the 'saddle' feels quite familiar. There's a rhythm to all work including parish ministry. I enjoy the weekly discipline of opening the scriptures to encounter the divine imagination of the Word. Preachers are expected to be ready for Sunday, yet no matter how imaginative or unimaginative I AM on any given Sunday, God's creative grace is refreshingly new. Truly, if all a person hears on Sunday morning is "...given for you," it is good news, the Gospel. How is that good news heard on days other than Sunday and places other than church?

While on sabbatical I had the opportunity to participate in two paddling adventures. Each was made even more enjoyable by my son Peter's willingness to be my partner. In the past I have normally paddled solo, but not this time. We paddled together over a long weekend in New Mexico and then for a week together in Wyoming. Other participants included a mixture of people I knew from previous trips and first-time people. It is on such trips that one becomes better acquainted with rivers, people and yourself.

Throughout ministry it has been my conviction that participation in an interest group where my role is not that of pastor is a healthy thing. When the majority of my time with others is in the role of pastor, it feels like a good balance to be simply a participant occasionally. My canoe groups allow me the opportunity. Now rest assured I don't wear a disguise or keep my calling a secret from the group. If someone asks me what "I do for a living" I tell them. But it isn't something I initially divulge for I want to start the friendship without titles or preconceived ideas.

So far I've made a number friends in the

groups. And even after they learn I'm a pastor the friendship continues to be genuine and affable. Sure, the conversation often doesn't go beyond canoe talk and river conditions, but there have also been some exceptions. Once while running the Cache la Poudre near Ft. Collins we came upon a raft guide sitting on the bank of the river. We knew an accident had happened earlier in the day where someone had died. As we learned, the guide was guiding the raft in which the death occurred and he was visibly upset. My paddling friend and I started talking to him to offer him support. I ended the brief conversation we had by saying a prayer before we paddled on. On our recent trip to Wyoming one of our group asked if I would offer a prayer before we ate together and so I did. It didn't become a "must-do" thing before every meal we shared, but a simple request followed by a simple response that blessed that moment in time. God uses each of us at such times if we know it or not.

A key leader in the Iona Community in Scotland we visited on sabbatical was a man named George MacLeod. He once wrote: I simply argue that the cross be raised again at the centre of the market place as well as on the steeple of the church. I AM recovering the claim that Jesus was not crucified in a cathedral between two candles, but on a cross between two thieves; on the town garbage heap; at a crossroads so cosmopolitan that they had to write his title in Hebrew and in Latin and in Greek...."

McLeod's message is timeless. It remind us that faith is real and has real consequences for our lives. May your journey through the crossroads of your life bring you to the living Christ.

#### Native American Prairie Rose Seminole

ur Rocky Mountain Synod is holding the annual Theological Conference on September 17-19 at the YMCA of the Rockies. One of the speakers at this year's conference is Prairie Rose Seminole, a Native American of the Sahnish/Arikara tribe.

In her bio she states "My people are nearly gone. We were once many in our great nation.... Our creation story is different from what is in the Bible. Is it our place to say that is wrong? No. It is our place to acknowledge that our creation, our migration, our history, is different from yours. No more, no less. Different. We view the world through a perspective that is not taught in mainstream history books." Prairie Rose is the Director of the American Indian Alaska Native Program for the ELCA.
