Pastor's Corner - The Third Force

ecently I was called on to provide mediation for two parties in our greater Estes Park community experiencing conflict. My involvement with Estes Park's Restorative Justice Program provided the opportunity to be trained in the art of mediation. And while I don't often work with mediation cases, I do find the process interesting and humbling. Luckily I have the help of a partner similarly trained to help conduct the process.

It would appear that we are experiencing conflict in many areas including the political, social, environmental and religious circles of society. The list of things we are not to discuss in polite company is growing longer all the time. How can this be happening when we are technologically more "connected" to one another than ever before? As we develop and find more cures for cancer and signs of life on Mars the norms of everyday life seem to be more uncertain. When we are in conflict, or even see it in others, our reaction is often to fall back on the primal instincts to either "fight" or take "flight." We may feel that most issues are just too complicated for us to become meaningfully engaged and so we don't. Now I'm not saying we need to take up every issue which comes our way but rather understand there is a third force available through faith in Christ.

As we abide in scripture and observe how Jesus operated we begin to see the unique ways he weaved in and out of human drama. Following his baptism he entered the wilderness, in effect detaching himself from all except his Father. Re-emerging he heads straight into the surrounding towns and villages to call his disciples, heal the sick and engage in religious debate. When sought by others he was found alone and in prayer. Jesus kept a healthy balance between detachment and attachment; isolation and en-

gagement; love and righteousness. He danced between polar opposites with holy grace which defined his life and purposes.

It was this third force of God's love in grace which Jesus so masterfully practiced that we have available to us. Take for example the story of the woman caught in adultery from John's Gospel, chapter 8. When the woman was brought before him the scribes and Pharisees presented him with two options: stone her or let her off. Jesus did neither. With the words, "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her," he showed a powerful insight for us to aim for. Sin was not ignored even as mercy was shown. The injustice which put the adulterous woman on trial and not the adulterous man was exposed. And lastly, the truth that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23) was plain to everyone that day. In the end it was Jesus and the woman. He said to her, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again"(v.11).

As we find ourselves drawn to a current-day conflict, called to be a positive influence, let us proceed free of anxiety and condemnation for those who don't see things as we do. We honor the indwelling of God in ourselves when we can honor the divine in the other person. This takes practicing the presence of God in our life and growth in faith. So if we think we have the better idea and deserve the last word, we have failed in our attempt to make the world a better place. None of us have the complete answer. But with God's help and humility we might discover the truth somewhere between us and our beloved neighbor. It is the third way.

I had the opportunity to meet with Sarah Adam, Community Life Coordinator, at the Urban Servant Corps office this week. We talked about USC's mission in the community and how that extends to the volunteers' personal lives. What struck me is how many opportunities there are for volunteers to better their communities and simultaneously take time to better themselves. With opportunities for faith, reflection, discussion about social issues, food education, etc. at the USC houses, the volunteers are truly living comprehensively in their faith and ministries.

Volunteers come to USC at all ages. Typically, USC sees recent college graduates and others in their 20s apply. However, this last year a retired nun found USC after her convent closed. Mary Kay is a volunteer at Family Promise, an organization that works with individuals and families who are at risk of being homeless.

The Rocky Mountain Synod Theological Conference will be held September 16-18 at the YMCA of the Rockies. Stephen Ministry Update



MLC plans to offer a Stephen Series course in the fall to begin our Stephen Ministry program and train our first Stephen Ministers. Stephen Ministers are lay people in the church who are equipped to provide high-quality, one-on-one Christian care to individuals who are experiencing a life challenge, such as grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, or a variety of other circumstances. The Stephen Series training will cover a variety of topics, including feelings, the art of listening, confidentiality, boundaries, and grief. The role of the Stephen Minister is to be there for a hurting person, to listen and walk with them throughout their challenge, without any judgment and with complete confidentiality.

Stephen Ministry began in 1975 in Saint Louis, Missouri. Today, Stephen Ministry is in more than 13,000 congregations, in all 50 states, 10 Canadian provinces, and more than 29 countries around the world. More than 70,000 lay people, church staff, and pastors have been trained to become Stephen Leaders (those who oversee and direct Stephen Ministry in the congregation). There have been more than 600,000 Stephen Ministers trained and these individuals have provided care to more than 1.5 million hurting people. The name Stephen comes from Acts 6, when St. Stephen was the first person to be commissioned by the apostles to provide caring ministry to hurting people.

The Stephen Leader team is making preparations to begin training our congregation's first class of Stephen Ministers. We invite anyone that is potentially interested in becoming a Stephen Minister to obtain an application from Bruce Brackman, Jenna Wahlstrom, or Pastor Ron. Interviews will be held during the month

of September and the training will begin the first week of October. An application process is important to ensure that our congregation is able to provide the highest quality care and that those involved are well suited and well prepared for the ministry.

An adult forum with more information will be held on Sunday, September 2nd, following worship. All are welcome and encouraged to attend and learn more.
