We Observe Advent--So That You May Hope Again--The Message of Christmas

his is the second in a series of articles based on the book, <u>A Door Set Open</u>, by Peter Steinke. The Church Council is reading the book and using it for devotions at the beginning of each meeting. The following subject material was chosen because of the reference to the book of Isaiah which we are now exploring in this season of Advent.

GOOD NEWS:

but if you ask me what it is, I know not;
It is a track in the snow,
It is a lantern showing a path,
It is a door set open.
--G.K. Chesterton, "Xmas Day"

The prophets in the Old Testament appeared on the scene when times were tough. God's people were tired and worried about an uncertain future. Their message for the people was often difficult to hear. They spoke critically to everyone including kings and leaders. Yet they also described visions which pictured good news for those desiring God. Just when the way forward seemed to be closed, the prophet's words showed a "door set open."

Beginning with the first chapter Isaiah points to the injustice and unrighteousness he sees around him. He becomes the mouthpiece of God who declares: "I have had enough of burnt offerings of rams and the fat of fed beasts; I do not delight in the blood of bulls, or of lambs, or of goats"(1:11). But just when you think Isaiah is all doom and gloom he surprises you saying: "...they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up

sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more"(2:4). The complaint of the prophet gives way to hope for those who stay with him. This is dialectical thinking and characteristic of Jewish thought throughout the Old Testament.

This bad news/good news scenario is certainly what we've come to expect in the season of Advent. John the Baptist announces One is coming after him who will baptize with both the Holy Spirit and fire. One sounds hopeful and the other ominous. Which is it? The answer is both! Hope emerges out of our difficulty more often than not.

Steinke points out that the word "hope, derives from the German hop, which means 'leaping expectations.' Hope is an exuberant response, particularly when things are in reverse, in decline, and in disrepair. In the movie Zorba the Greek, a wealthy entrepreneur loses his profitable business and turns to his friend Zorba, and says, 'Zorba, teach me to dance.' In other words, 'Zorba, teach me to leap, to see beyond ground zero—essentially, to hope again."

As I read the prophets I sense they want to instill hope in people's lives, but in a true and lasting manner. For it to happen the temptation to deny, despair and grab the quick fix must be avoided. Only complete reliance upon God can transform us and our situation.

dvent is a time of reflection and new beginnings. We remember with thanks the November in-gathering when we dedicated & packed up another 50 quilts to send to Lutheran World Relief. One of those quilts was from the quilt drawing, generously donated back by the Wold's grand daughter and her friend. Thanks to your generosity, \$154 was sent to the Lutheran World Relief shipping fund to cover the cost of shipping these quilts overseas.

With the 54 already sent this summer that totals 104 quilts - the largest number we have ever sent in one year. This was in addition to prayer quilts, baptismal quilts, going away quilts, quilts given to speakers and the more than 30 quilts given to La Puente. Thank you all for your support of this wonderful concrete ministry of love and care to our neighbors around the world.



Thrivent shirts to give thanks to Thrivent for generous community action grants requested and kindly obtained for us by Kay & Curt Olthoff, summer members of SMLC. These grants have allowed us to purchase a good supply of quilt batting - maybe even enough for our next 50 quilts. Kay faithfully helps us assemble quilts in the summer. She suggested the possibility of Thrivent Community Action Grants to help us purchase quilt batting and other needed quilt supplies. Kay and Curt obtained grants for us this fall shortly after their return to Iowa! We are so thankful for their help and Thrivent's generous grants for our quilting ministry.

We ended our quilting year sorting through some of the boxes of material God has generously provided by you and others in the community who have seen and heard of our quilting ministry. These wonderfully laid the foundation for a busy new year of quilt work.

Advent is a time for new beginnings, as we gather at the church to assemble, tie and sew quilts for the new year on Thursday, December 12 from 9 to 11:30. On December 19 our annual fellowship outing is planned as we celebrate the past and plan for 2020. ooking for stocking stuffer ideas? Look no further than the Equal Exchange cart in the narthex. You will find several kinds of full-sized chocolate bars as well as bite-sized minis. There is also comforting tea and hot chocolate as well as the ever popular red bag coffee, in regular and decaf. Giving gifts from Equal Exchange not only shows someone you care but also benefits small farmers from around the world.

Shepherd of the Mountains has supported this ministry for several years. Here are some numbers to show how we have accomplished this in 2019. So far this year, WELCA has financed the purchase of \$541.60 of fair trade coffee, tea, cocoa and chocolate inventory so people could more easily help small farmers. During that time, people have contributed \$421.05 to acquire the products for the cart. Additionally, the church has purchased \$383.00 worth of Equal Exchange coffee for use on Sundays and other hospitality events. This adds up to over \$900.00 from Shepherd of the Mountains in support of small farmers through Equal Exchange.

Please consider turning to Equal Exchange ANY time you are in the market for coffee, tea or chocolate. You will probably never meet these small farmers but you can rest assured that they can feel your love.
