R ecently I suggested to the church council that we read a book together and they agreed. Following their agreement I then suggested that we read the book, <u>A Door Set</u> <u>Open</u>, by Peter Steinke, and they agreed again.

look to the future.

There Once Was a World is the title to the first chapter. In it Peter Steinke writes: "Much of what's being faced and experienced by many mainline protestant churches is not about them. It is about the end of an era, a sea change in the religious ecology of North American and the role of congregations in our society. American Christendom is over."

You might not be familiar with the term "Christendom". If not, think back to the time in our country when the Christian Faith had a big influence on the norms and customs of our society. There was a time when Sundays were reserved for church and very few stores were open for business. A well-known preacher named Will Willimon tells how he and a couple of buddies slipped out the back of the church during Sunday evening youth group to attend a movie showing downtown. It was his earliest recollection of how the influence of the Christian Faith was changing in our society. Another popular term for this is "post-Christian-era".

Instead of becoming defensive about this or lamenting all the ways this affects our church,

the point is to observe and take note of the many changes occurring around us. Don't get me wrong, we can be sad about this and grieve the loss we experience but it does us no good to wallow in blame and judgement.

The most obvious way this impacts Shepherd of the Mountains is how we moderns go about time and place. Who among us isn't "busy" in some way or another? Even in retirement many of us have full calendars. Each day we have numerous events at our disposal. There are so many events to attend we don't stop to consider what meaning they hold. Even a captivating place like Estes Park doesn't slow us from visiting other beautiful places. Steinke writes about the increase of "non-places". "Non-places are spaces designed for anonymity, passing through and non-engagement. Disappearing are places intended for relationship, such as churches and civic groups."

I believe that our church offers a respite from "Supermodernity"—a Steinke term! Yes! Our hour of worship is meant to be unlike any other hour in people's lives. But more importantly is our character as disciples of Christ! We won't attract others by trying to out-modernize –my term—them! Instead, we will be Christ's Church by living out Christian community, meaning and hope. This is true for our witness as a congregation and as individual members of the body of Christ.

Sarah Adams - Originally from St. Paul, Minnesota, Sarah moved to Colorado to participate in Urban Servant Corps - a yearlong, full-time volunteer program of the ELCA located in Denver. Prior to that Sarah served as a YAGM in

Madagascar. Sarah now works in higher education. Sarah enjoys the beach, the mountains and spontaneous dance parties.



Emily Haskins - From Centennial, CO, Emily is currently a Master's of Social Work student in her 2nd year at Metropolitan State University. She is currently interning at

the St. Francis Apartments at Cathedral Square, a permanent supportive housing facility with 49 unites to support men and women transitioning out of homelessness. As a YAGM, she taught English in Madagascar in 2015-2016, living in Fianarantsoa located in south central Madagascar primarily at the Malagasy Lutheran Graduate School of Theology where she taught English to pastors and theologians. She also helped with her church's weekly English club and joined her church's choir. During this time she lived with her Malagasy host family who included her in the fold of their daily lives.
