Dear Members and Friends of Shepherd of the Mountains,

n response to recent events in our larger church, the ELCA, your church council wants you to be kept informed of our attitude and actions as we continue to lead the ministry of Shepherd of the Mountains.

Every three years the ELCA gathers in assembly to conduct the business of the church. This is different than a "synod assembly." Our "Rocky Mountain Synod" meets annually to conduct its business. Each year our congregation sends three voting members to the synod assembly.

There were no voting members from SMLC at the churchwide assembly in Milwaukee the first week in August but there were members, both laity and clergy, from our synod. The vote at the church-wide assembly was a "memorial." Memorials address broad policy issues or programs in the churchwide organization. Memorials start with individuals in congregations, then are passed up to synod assemblies. If passed by a synod, they go to committee in the ELCA that recommends or doesn't recommend it to the churchwide assembly for a vote.

The recent assembly adopted 26 memorials, one of which designates the ELCA as a "sanctuary church body." It is our understanding this memorial reaffirms our denomination will continue to support refugees and immigrants through our partnership with Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services, which originated after World War II. Also our church is committed to advocate for humane treatment of detained immigrants through a program called AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities). In addition, congregations that have the resources to do so, will continue to provide assistance in their communities to those in need in legally appropriate ways. This final point is relevant to our congregation. We understand it as encouragement for the work we already do through: Cafe' Corner, Crossroads, La Puente and ELCA World Hunger. We do not see it as a mandate.

We believe the ELCA didn't help its cause by using language that included 'sanctuary'. It is unfortunate this word originating from faith has nowadays taken on a political overtone. We are committed to ongoing exploration and learning on what this means for our congregation. With this commitment we will hold to our values which include respect, acceptance and Christ-centered hospitality for all people, even when viewpoints are different.

We invite you into this important conversation, especially if you are upset with the vote of the assembly. By the guidance of God's Word and the Holy Spirit, we as a congregation will determine the shape of our ministry looking forward. You are an important part of shaping that future.

Coffee, Chocolate and Tea. Oh My!

all is approaching and with the cooler temperatures, warm beverages and yummy chocolate can be great comfort food for us. They are also empower small-scale farmers worldwide. Please revisit the Equal Exchange cart in the narthex to see what products you can purchase. If you are a coffee drinker, please consider the red bag organic coffee. This coffee" has a creamy mouth-feel and hints of brownie, roasted nut and caramel." The hot cocoas are made using organic cacao from the Dominican Republic and Peru and the sugarcane is from small-scale farmers in Paraguay. You will also find boxes of tea bags, 20 in a box. This tea is grown by smallscale farmers and is revolutionary in an industry dominated by large plantations. Equal Exchange partners with growers in India, South Africa and Sri Lanka to build this alternative supply chain.

WELCA did not undertake this relationship with Equal Exchange as a fund raiser. There is no profit built into the listed prices. They understood that supporting this coop is better for our planet, better for the small-scale farmers and better for our family and friends. Please consider turning to the Equal Exchange cart first when you need any of the products displayed. The actions you take locally make a difference globally.

Looking Ahead - Mission Support In 2020

ome of us have been asked to assist our congregation in identifying and under-girding our mission as we look ahead to 2020. We want to approach this under the theme "BOUND-LESS GENEROSITY!" A number of our members are helping by completing and sharing the Generosity Survey that you received recently. Thank you! If you have not yet completed that time of reflection and sharing, there is still time. Some shared reflections stand out:

- Happy memories "It is better to give than to receive." "Any unexpected kindness." "The first time I truly experienced forgiveness and the unconditional love of God!" "Watching Mom giving so freely and quietly of herself, especially with elderly friends."
- How is our church generous? "Sharing the building...Community Cafe...Help in La Puente and Crossroads." "Making quilts for Lutheran World Relief."
- How could our church be generous in new ways? "Reach out to the unchurched and invite them in." "Temple talks by members who have been blessed to be a blessing, always encourages thinking about new ways to be generous." "We could be more intentional and focused...get more involved in the projects we support."
- Something important about generosity that we haven't asked (in this survey)? "What does it mean to have a generous spirit?" "That love is given!" "Generosity is unconditional!"
